Call for Application

- Through its network and database, ISC reached out to organizations working in the areas of sanitation, based on the eligibility criteria decided upon by the Jury

Preliminary Screening

 Initial screening by the ISC Secretariat, to ensure adherence to eligibility criteria

Executive Committee Meeting

 An Executive Committee was formed to screen each category and shortlist the top 3 applications. This was carried out before the final jury meeting. The executive committee consisted of 1 Jury member and 2 non-jury members (representatives of other organisations affiliated to ISC).

Jury Meeting

 The 2-3 shortlisted applications for each were reviewed by the jury. The representatives of the shortlisted organisations made a presentation to the jury and answered additional questions.

Final Awardees Selected

 Post the meeting /presentation with the shortlisted organizations, the Jury finalized the winners in each category. ISC reached out to inform them and invite them to the awards.



Mashelkar, presently National Research Professor and President of Global Research Alliance was the Director General of Council of Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR) and President of Indian National Science Academy. Dr. Mashelkar is Fellow of Royal Society (FRS), Foreign Associate of US National Academy of Science and also National Academy of Engineering, Associate Foreign Member, American Academy of Arts & Sciences (2011), Fellow of Royal Academy of Engineering, U.K. (1996). He is Fellow of US National Academy of Inventors (2017), the first ever Indian from India to be elected.

Dr. Mashelkar also is currently the Chairman of India's National Innovation Foundation, Reliance Innovation Council, KPIT Technologies Innovation Council, Persistent Systems Innovation Council and Marico Foundation's Governing Council. He co-chairs the Maharashtra State Innovation Council. In post-liberalized India, Dr. Mashelkar has played a critical role in shaping India's S&T institutions as policies. He was a member of the Scientific Advisory Council to the Prime Minister set up by successive governments for 3 decades.

He has honorary doctorates from 38 universities from around the world. The President of India honored Dr. Mashelkar with Padmashri (1991), with Padmabhushan (2000) and with Padma Vibhushan (2014).

The Initiative

Integrated Community Development Program (ICDP) has been initiated in severely water-stressed areas spread over three states across India with a view to improve quality of life. 

The Initiative MANTRA catalyzes a community owned and managed development process, with water and sanitation as

the entry point. It is built on the core principles of 100% inclusion, cost-sharing on an equitable basis, equal role for men and women and ensuring sustainability through apt institutional and financial mechanisms. Every household in the participating village builds a toilet and bathing room. The Village Water & Sanitation

Committee ensures piped water supply through 3 taps to every household.

Impact 75,000 families and 1311 villages have created their own sanitation and water infrastructure, benefitting

more than 3.6 lakh persons. Reduced disease incidence and drudgery for women, improved nutritional status among children, and enhanced abilities of the village communities to influence local governance are

benefits of MANTRA from 1995 till now.

Name of Initiative : Beyond Toilets: Making cities ODF and ODF+

The Initiative Work towards addressing the entire sanitation service chain in 2 towns of Maharashtra (Wai and Sinnar);

from 2013 has led to these towns becoming ODF. From 2013 focus is on sustaining the ODF status and making them ODF+, through citywide faecal sludge management. These interventions are designed to

cover operating expenses from local sanitation tax.

Impact The support has resulted in citywide access for 115,000 persons to quality individual or community toilets,

increased usage and eradication of open defecation. Introduction of scheduled emptying and FSTP will lead to both cities becoming ODF+. Knowledge and Learning products were used to develop a state level ODF+

and ODF++ framework, which was adopted in the national FSSM policy.

THE INITIATIVE One Home One Toilet (OHOT) model is unique because of its data-driven approach, use of technology such

as Geographic Information Systems (GIS), Google Earth coupled with android based smart phone

technology, and integral behaviour change component. To ensure sustainability, the cost sharing model is implemented in partnership with local governments and slum communities to deliver household sanitation

ensuring its alignment with the Swachh Bharat Mission.

Impact SA's model has allowed cities to address gaps in a targeted manner by strategizing phased interventions. SA

has reached 350,000 people directly & indirectly by facilitating close to 12,500 household toilets.

The Pune Municipal Corporation under SBM has replicated SA's model to rank 1st across India by delivering

46,500+ household toilets.

The model aims to target issues in health, safety and environment but also provides a data driven

mechanism supporting effective policy implementation and government fund utilization.

The InitiativeThe aim of the proposed intervention is 'creating access to credit for safe water and sanitation for sustaining

the livelihood enhancement of poor towards better standard of living. The initiative also focuses on

enhancing knowledge and attitude using behavior change communication as a strategy; demonstrating cost

effective WATSAN models with enabling people governance for monitoring and sustainability.

Impact The initiative has impacted 1.89 lakh households with safe water and sanitation infrastructures benefiting 7.5

lakh populations in 267 blocks from 13 states. It facilitated the credit worth of INR 402 Crore for the same. The model highlighted the efforts of partnerships with local governments, block and district administrations.

The sustainability of the initiative is ensured through promotion of people governance at grassroots.

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Special Recognition in Media: Vikram Chandra (Individual)

Vikram Chandra, a prolific journalist and one of India's best known TV anchors, has continuously talked about how India can get on the path of becoming a cleaner and subsequently a healthier nation. He has been named "Global Leader for Tomorrow" and a 'Young Global Leader' by the World Economic Forum in Davos; and has won the Indian Television Academy Award for "Best Anchor for a Talk Show", the Hero Honda Award for Best Anchorperson and the Teacher's Achievement Award for Communication.

Vikram Chandra has been closely associated with social programming for public interest and has anchored a number of NDTV's social campaigns including several 'GREENATHONS', the 'Support my School' drive, the Banega Swacch India campaign.

NDTV – Dettol Banega Swachh India, a campaign focusing on sensitizing India about proper sanitation and hygiene practices whilst working tirelessly towards making the country cleaner, was launch on 25th September, 2014. The campaign discussed in detail the consequences of practices such as open-defecation, ignorance towards lack of personal hygiene, lack of safai karamcharis, manual – scavenging, overflowing landfills, poor-quality drainage and sewerage, air-pollution, the degrading condition of India's rivers and dams amongst many other topics.

The campaign introduced the Hygiene Curriculum in 'Swachhta Ki Pathshaalas' hosted in various schools to encourage people to donate their 'time' towards the cause and commit to work towards 'swachhta. It helped galvanize the entire nation to take up the cause of cleanliness by taking the pledge to clean at least 10 yards as part of the #Mere10Guz movement.

The campaign, in partnership with the government of Maharashtra, organized a 'Maha-Cleanathon' hosted by Vikram, with an agenda to clean-up 10 iconic locations in India, and got the nation together to celebrate 2nd October as Rashtriya Swachhta Diwas.

The agenda grew wider to take a holistic approach to Swachhta with #Mere10Guz by promoting 3 steps to swachhta - cleanliness, waste segregation and composting. The campaign once again dedicated October 2nd to observe Rashtriya Swachhta Diwas with a 12-hour Cleanathon and received massive support from various experts from government, celebrities, and religious leaders.





Special Recognition in Media: Dainik Jagran (Institutional)

Dainik Jagran with a readership of over 55 million, covers 11 states of India. It has also been declared by the World Association of Newspapers (WAN) as the largest read daily in the world. As a responsible media house Jagran uses its capacity and reach to work towards the developmental goals to elevate and transform the livelihood of the people for a better future by playing a crucial role in advocacy. A part of the CSR initiative of Dainik Jagran, Jagran Pehel especially addresses the issues of sanitation through its multiple mass media initiatives and activities.

Some other projects

Behavior Change Communication Initiative:

In 2015, RB and Jagran Pehel launched a joint initiative "Changing Behavior: Creating Sanitation Change Leaders" to drive behavior change at the grassroots by empowering leaders within the communities such as religious leaders, frontline workers, mothers, caregivers and communities towards hygiene and sanitation practices across 200 villages in UP and Bihar to make them open defecation free and tackle the impact of bad hygiene and sanitation practices on newborn health, nutrition, occurrence of diarrhea along with education.

Project Hope:

With a vision to promote affordable health and hygiene products for hand washing and sanitation to reduce incidences of diarrhea, Jagran and Dettol Banega Swach India(DBSI) had partnered to launch an initiative in Uttar Pradesh and Uttarakhand by creating and engaging women entrepreneurs. The key focus is to drive behavior change in these communities, at the same time ensuring last mile availability of sanitation products.

World Toilet College:

With an aim to elevate 5000 Manual Scavengers by 2020, Jagran Pehel proposes to have a series of print and digital media spaces dedicated to advocating and identifying platforms that promote better professional opportunities for Manual Scavengers, the programme also involves providing entrepreneurship models with support from the respective Municipal Corporation in order to provide an opportunity to completely eliminate the need for direct human intervention to manage sewers etc.

Kumbh 2019, Allahabad: As part of the partnership program between RB and Jagran Pehel, a six member team has been deployed in Allahabad for Kumbh 2019 with a special focus on WASH and to work in close coordination with the Kumbh Administration.

Gorakhpur, Japanese Encephalitis: By a series of mass-mid media activities Jagran Pehel under the DBSI initiative plans to educate the community on how Good Hygiene and Sanitation practices can play an important role in prevention of Japanese Encephalitis.

Special Recognition to the Government (Individual): Nipun Vinayak

Dr. Nipun Vinayak, joined the IAS in Maharashtra Cadre (2001). His professional achievements include his work as CEO, Zilla Parishad, Jand the Prime Minister's Award for Excellence in Public Administration by Government of Maharashtra. He believes that good governance is about the 3Ps – Passion, Participation and Partnership. He authored his first book on sanitation - 'Beyond Sanitation', much before the launch of the current national programme – Swachh Bharat. The book is based on his experiences in rural sanitation in Jalna, a backward district in the Marathwada region of Maharashtra. Implementing the community approach model in the district, he converted sanitation into a social movement.

He continued his engagement with sanitation in his later role as Municipal Commissioner, Nanded. Nanded became the first city to use community engagement approach at a city-wide level.

He utilised his learnings of the field to convert Swachh Bharat into a collective behavioural change programme – from earlier 'toilet -construction' programmes. He took initiatives to define the term Open Defecation Free (ODF) – a term that has now become synonymous with sanitation. He built the Swachh Bharat team, using social media effectively, and played a key role in spreading the spark and creating champions. He regularly blogs on sanitation issues, and has captured his learnings in the form of 'Swachhta Idea book'. He was also instrumental in the development of Knowledge Management portal of the Ministry, Swachha Sangraha. He has just finished writing a book on his experiences in Swachh Bharat, titled 'Deep in Shit'. He mentions in his book "I did not choose shit, shit chose me."

Till date 2,520 cities have been declared ODF of which 1,976 have been certified as ODF.

 Approximately 47 lac individual household toilets and 3.16 lac community and public toilets seats constructed till date.

 In Swachh Survekshan 2018, approx. 38 lac citizens gave their feedback and till 10th March, 2018 approx 77 Lakh citizens registered 1.28 Crore complaints through SwachhataApp, out of which 1.22 Crore complaints resolved
